AUTHORING THROUGH AUTHORHOUSE

One woman's experience By Deanna O'Daniel

Naturally, we all want to publish a book, even though we don't claim that to be true when we first start writing. I started writing my memoir about my family's history, simply to preserve it for my children. After joining "Women Who Write," I was encouraged by many great writers there that I should go for publishing since the era (mid-twentieth century) was fast disappearing from our collective memories and my book would "anchor" part of it into the public's mind again.

Being the oldest daughter in a family of 11 children growing up on a farm in a suburban area, is something that is a bit unique. I use my family's experiences to loosely preserve the way things were looked at and done during that period of the 1940's and '50s. I also take the reader back to places that we can no longer experience in today's world. For example, a day is spent at Fountain Ferry Park, doing the rides and the roller rink. We go downtown to shop and relive the fun of the dimestores and the elegance of Stewart's Dry Goods – Louisville's most renowned department store.

It's all done in a spirit of fun and hopefulness keeping in mind that this was America's greatest period of prosperity for the middleclass. I say fun, even though my brothers and I did several battles over my desire for women's rights, because at that time, the female sex was definitely considered subservient.

As far as publishing, like one of the consultants at Evanston publishing told me, "There is a lot of difference between writing a book and getting it published. The first thing I did was to go through the yellow pages and call all the local publishers. I also asked all my published friends of their choice. I kept copious notes.

The book must be proofed 3 times, and of course you end up doing a lot of rewrites. That process took about 9 months. I was going with Rita Jones publisher, Westerfield-Bonte. I really like their set-up and price. Rita gave me the name of her formatter and cover designer.

He designed a cover for me, and was very helpful. However, I decided to go with Authorhouse, in Bloomington,IN because they help you market it through 25,000 bookstore websites. I have two author friends who like them a lot. I have found them hard to get in touch with and feel I am working mostly in the dark. They want to do most things through email, and I like to talk to people. It was very difficult getting my manuscript and photos and captions ready, in the way they wanted them. I put it on a disk and mailed it last Friday. I also mailed one to me to protect my copyright assurance.

At this point, I am still in the process, I hope things get better, now that they have the book, and can answer my many questions. So, I hope the next time I see you all, I have better things to say about Authorhouse.

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WHAT IS AN ISBN AND DO I NEED ONE?

ISBN

It stands for International Standard Business Number and it is a unique number which identifies your book from the other hundreds of thousands of books currently in and out of print.

If I self-publish using POD (print on demand) technology, do I still have to have an ISBN?

In order to sell your book online or in a bookstore you must have an ISBN. You can purchase your own ISBN or have one furnished to you free of charge by your publisher.


Should I pay for it or let my publisher buy it for me?

A single ISBN purchased from Bowker International (bowker.com) costs \$125.00 US. ISBN's can be purchased in blocks of ten or more for significant discounts. To take advantage of these discounts you must be a publishing company. If you are self-publishing through AuthorHouse, iUniverse, or Createspace they will provide the ISBN free of charge, but think twice before choosing that option. The owner of the ISBN is the "publisher of record" for that book. This means that if you publish your book, and a producer wants to make a movie of your book, he will contact the publisher of record. If you didn't purchase your own ISBN, then you are the author, but not the publisher. The producer will negiotiate with the publisher for rights to the book!
